The most important activity of the Corporate Counsel Section is communication with its members. This year we published three excellent newsletters with news of section activities and articles of general interest. In addition, we held member luncheons in three cities.

The section participated in the Task Force on Admission of Corporate Counsel convened by the Virginia Board of Bar Examiners and the State Bar at the request of the Supreme Court. The section provided substantial input to the work of the task force, which issued its first report in January. The task force should complete its work next year.

For the fifth year, the section sponsored a law school writing competition. Students submit articles of general interest to corporate counsel; up to three awards are given for the best entries, judged primarily on the author's analysis, creativity and persuasiveness. The winners were

The Corporate Counsel Section closed its active year by joining with the Bankruptcy Law Section to sponsor a CLE program titled, "Workouts to Washouts: Protecting your Clients' Interests in a Troubled Economy," at the VSB annual meeting.
