LEGAL ETHICS OPINION 364

CONFIDENCES AND SECRETS –
IMMUNITY.

It would not be ethically proper for an attorney to reveal to the Commonwealth's Attorney that his client is, in fact, guilty of a crime rather than the actual accused, for purposes of obtaining immunity for his client, unless his client expressly consents to such disclosure.
